Why study Health and Social Care?

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You should consider studying this course if you have an interest in a career in the caring profession including: health care, social care and early years. The course will provide you with essential knowledge, transferable skills and tools to improve your learning and own personal development within these sectors.

The care sector is the biggest employment sector in the UK, and this course will allow you to explore the role it plays in health, well-being and care of individuals of all ages. You will also have the opportunity to develop a range of transferable skills including the ability to empathise with others, communicate effectively with individuals, work as part of a team, make informed decisions, analyse and evaluate information within different Health and Social Care settings.

This course will help you to prepare for many care courses post 16, including A Levels or Vocational courses. This could include: Health and Social Care, Adult Care, Early Years, Child Care. There are also many different career paths such as Nurse, Childcare, Health Visitor, Counsellor, Social Worker, Community Support Work, Occupational Therapist and many more.

Course Overview

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Examinations and Assessments

- The three pieces of coursework (RO22, RO23, RO27): students complete the knowledge and learning aspects then demonstrate their understanding through a series of activities. This is internally assessed and externally moderated. The final pieces of work and evidence are submitted at the end of year 11.
- Summative assessments take place at the end of each half term to ascertain overall subject progress.
- End of year 10 exam – RO21

In year 11

- Two mock exam series in November (RO21) and March (RO21)
- One final exam at the end of year 11 – RO21
- RO22, RO23, RO27 – submitted for moderation at the end of year 11

Question	Health and Social Care
How many papers will I take?	One paper – R021. It is worth 25% of your final grade.
How long is the exam paper?	60 minutes
When is the exam paper sat?	At the end of year 11
How much is the coursework worth?	All of the three pieces of coursework are worth 25% each and so make up 75% of your final grade.

The examination will include short open response questions as well as extended writing questions.
