# TOP REVISION TIPS FOR MUSIC

- Listen, listen, listen to the set works
- Practise describing each set work in terms of:
  - Melody
  - Tonalties, chords, cadences
  - Rhythm
  - Texture layers
  - Instrumentation
  - Structure
  - Tempo, dynamics, phrasing
  - Context/genre
  - Historical period
- Practise 'tuning your ears' to just one instrument within a busy texture
- Practise notating melodies from the set works
- Listen to other pieces of music to practise your listening skills rather than memory
