To the commemorative edition of the OBHS Gazette.







Some of the students in 1938


View of the School 1938

MEMORIES

Extracts from "My Story" written by Alan Arthur Rudd (born 1/11/1932) in Wilby, Norfolk

"...My fist school was a small building on the green opposite the war memorial which stands on the other side of the road."

"...The building of the new, Old Buckenham Area School must have been going on a year or so before I started school, because when it opened I was still in the infant class and Mrs Stevenson was still my teacher, the infant classroom had a small room in one corner which had a small bed in, so if any child didn't feel well they could have a lay down, I remember doing so, also I am sure we all knitted different coloured wool squares which were sewn together to make a patchwork cover for this bed. "



"...We had a new Headmaster Mr Twiddy and his wife Mrs Twiddy was

headmistress. This was a very large modern school and children came from villages all around the area, these children were issued with school bicycles to get to school, there was just one bus which brought the children from Shropham and Rockland."

"...This was a lovely school compared to the old village ones which I suppose were built in the 17/1800s, at that new school there were at least eight classrooms, a large assembly hall with a stage, domestic science for the girls and carpentry for the boys, I think the dining hall had not been completed when we first went there, we had some lovely school dinners there, fish and chips I am sure on a Thursday, chocolate pudding and custard, these were my favourites. The arrangement for dinners in the dining hall I remember was us small kids, we had to sit 3 or 4 each side of a table and 2 seniors one each end, a boy and a girl, had to go and get the food and serve it to us. On one occasion the girl serving our table was sick bringing a dish of mashed potatoes to us, it flew out over the dish, I think it missed!! There were always 2 teachers on duty in the hall and one of them took the dish back, they scraped the top off the mashed potatoes and brought it back to our table. (These little things stick in your mind)."

"...One thing just came to mind, the school did not have corridors, like they would have today, there was a veranda all the way round so you could go all round the classrooms without getting wet in bad weather."

"...I do remember after the 11+ exam my teacher Miss Gotts was not very pleased as no one in the class passed. I think I put my name and date on the paper and nothing else. I know my school mate and I played marbles all the way home after the exam was

over as it was only a half day for the exam, anyway if you did pass it would mean you had to cycle all the way to Diss Grammar School, which was at least 7 miles away and we had a lovely school in the village!!"
