

# PAPILLON PROJECT

The Papillon Project works with secondary schools all across Norfolk to inspire young people and aid teachers to create and develop school allotments.

Since September, Old Buckenham High School has been working with Matt Willer from the Papillon Project to create an allotment in the grounds of the school. This has been made entirely from former rubbish, recyclable items and reclaimed wood.

We spoke to Matt, Projects Lead and Founder, and he shared with us, "our main purpose of this allotment is to inspire the next generation to learn how to grow their own food."

The Papillon project has inspired the whole school, who have been actively working, to create a quiet space that all year groups can use.

Matt explained to us, "it can be nerve wracking turning up in somebody else's school, however I have been made to feel incredibly welcome by all of your students. It is a privilege to be working here with so many of your pupils."

As part of my bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award I have been volunteering on the school allotment, I

started working on this in early October, since then it has really transformed. To start with we had an overgrown piece of land (where the old swimming pool used to be) and it needed lots of work doing to it. Matt (who works for the Papillon Project) has been helping us and others to build our new allotment on it. We have been using a range of skills such as carpentry and gardening. So far, we have helped build raised beds, fences, and a hut out of pallets and old fences. Its looking great! We have been filling the raised beds with manure and covering it with hay bales. It's hard work but it means they are ready for winter. Recently we have started thinking about what we want to grow, and I have written a letter to a local garden centre asking if they could donate a fruit tree. Everyone is having great fun and there is a real buzz around when we are there. It's exciting and I am really looking forward to next year to continue the amazing work we are doing.



# **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

Following a recent successful bid to Waitrose Community Matters scheme, we have been lucky enough to receive a donation of £333.


In the 12 months prior to the pandemic we raised **almost £3000** – every penny was donated back into school to support various departments with the purchase of resources or financing projects.
